

DOG GONE

Directed by Julie Buckles (15 Minutes)

A woman explores her own history with sled dogs. Winner of the 2009 Mae Greenwood Film Festival.

EXTREME LIZ CHALLENGE

Directed by Liz Woodworth (10 minutes)

One woman demonstrates how she is pretty much better than everyone.

EUROPE: A SUCCESSFUL STORY

Directed by Francesco Altomonte (63 minutes)

With narration, archival footage, and contemporary interviews, this film recaps the history of Europe from the end of World War II on, and tells of its attempts to avoid the destruction of war by the creation of institutions of peace. In Italian, with English subtitles.

LEDGLING

Directed by Tony Gault and Elizabeth Henry (7 minutes)

A father brings home a baby crow for his daughter to care for, and eventually re-unite with its family. But will their experiment be in harmony with nature?

FLORAL RESERVE: ALDO LEOPOLD AND THE WILD PRAIRIE ORCHIDS

Directed by Charles Johannsen (50 Minutes)

This documentary helps define who Aldo Leopold was and what he was working for: the preservation of prairie land in Wisconsin and the rare flowers and plants that define it.

GOING UNDER

Directed by David Doering (18 Minutes)

This docu-comedy explores why a group of people would jump through a hole in the ice of Lake Superior.

GUIDING THE TEAM

Directed by Kaitlin Randolph (4 minutes)

This short is a glimpse into the relationship between the Carlton College women's track and field team and their coach, Donna Ricks.

HEAD

Directed by Dean Rank (23 Minutes)

A man with an unfortunate physical attribute discovers love and loss and learns of his mythical qualities within.

HAPPY BOY/ ONE OF THOSE DAYS

Directed by Craig Knitt (12 minutes)

A young man's creative efforts to solve his problem when he is distracted at the gas station and pumps more gas than he can afford. Delightful acting and sound track.

I FEEL TIGHT

Directed by John Akre (4 minutes)
A spirited, music-driven, animated short.

JENNY'S DREAMLAND

Directed by Juli Pitzer (7 Minutes)

Jenny encounters the most unusual characters on the way home from school.

LADY OF THE WOODS

Directed by Aleshia Mueller (10 minutes) A documentary about Alma Christensen, a self taught botanist and expert on wild edible plants who makes ends meet by canning and gardening, and whose love of

life in the woods is contagious.



LAST COMMUNICATION WITH LAURA

Directed by Alexander Carson (4 minutes)

In this cinematic farewell love letter, a man in an angel costume revisits a failed romance.

THE OTHER SIDE OF PARADISE

Directed by Justin Hilliard (120 minutes)

A comedy about a young artist's road trip across Texas to her first gallery opening, with her misfit younger brother and a newly single friend.

THE PAPER MAN

Directed by Zach Finch (7 Minutes)

A lonely man has a visitor that changes his life.

PETE'S PALACE

Directed by Amanda Becker (7 minutes)

One man finds a way to beat the long, cold Minnesota winter by creating a palace of ice in his own backyard.

POINT TO LAPOINTE SWIM 2008

Directed by David Doering (20 minutes)

The story of a swim race between Bayfield on the Wisconsin mainland and LaPointe on Madeline Island, through the majestic waters of Lake Superior.

PORTRAIT OF AN ARTIST

Directed by Jake Ryan and Leo Joseph Marks (24 minutes)

Eccentric artist Mary Newman of Minneapolis is featured in this film portrait. Mary is a woman who lives her vocation, using her home, inside and out, as a gallery for her creative talents. It is a story of perseverance and how an artist lives as a member of her community.

SABINA ZIMERING....A MEMOIR OF COURAGE

Directed by Gwen Briesemeister (10 minutes)

The true story of Jewish Holocaust survivor Sabina Zimering, who obtained false papers to disguise her identity in occupied Poland. Sabina shares her story of fear, courage, friendship and hatred while "hiding in the open during" World War II.

SHE'S SO COLD

Directed by Angel Connell (13 minutes)

In this psychological noir drama, a mysterious woman's request to view the videotaped confession of a madman sets off fierce gossip among the government office clerks about the woman's relationship with the madman and her deceased sister: intimations of murder, incest, and necrophilia abound.

STOCKING STUFFERS

Directed by Angel Connell (8 minutes)

Angel Connell uses humor to explore how an object of desire—here, the shapely leg of a young woman draped in hosiery—can be used to enhance humane values as well as subvert them.

THE SWAN LADY OF MONTICELLO

Directed by Gwen Briesemeister (6 minutes)

For more than 20 years, Sheila Lawrence has been feeding the trumpeter swans that winter along the Mississippi River near Monticello, Minnesota. Her strength, fortitude and sheer adoration of nature has resulted in the largest single gathering of trumpeter swans in the world.

TOOTH FAIRY

Directed by Susan Ee (5 minutes)

A little boy finds a novel way to make money—with unintended consequences.

TRUST US, THIS IS ALL MADE UP

Directed by Alex Karpovsky (120 minutes)

Alex Karpovsky is a nationally recognized filmmaker (Hole, Woodpecker) who won last year's Best Feature award at the Big Water. This year he has sent us his new film, which follows two incredibly talented improv actors, TJ Jagodowski and Dave Pasquesi, as they create an entire 50 minute play out of thin air at the Barrow Street Theater in downtown Manhattan.



TWO ROOMS IN THE VALLEY

Directed by Don Scribner (75 minutes)

As a middle-aged man, Washburn native Don Scribner left the security of his teaching job to pursue a career as an actor in Hollywood. This is a film adaptation of his one-man play, set on a stage version of his "two rooms in the Valley."

WOMEN IN HORSE RACING: THE BETTYE GABRIEL STORY

Directed by Margaret Orlando, Rosemary Orlando, and Colleen Musker (60 Minutes) This is not only a documentary of one woman's role in horse racing, but provides some great insights into the sport itself. Shot on some of the most prestigious tracks and horse facilities in the nation.

YOU KNOW MY NAME

Directed by Angel Connell (6 minutes)

Inspired by an obscure Beatles tune of the same name, this comedy, set in a surrealistic dating agency, involves a woman viewing videotapes of a male prospect who seems to have multiple personalities.
